#### The Last Interim Pastor's Column

I have met a number of people who said they could not wait to retire. They were going to buy a ranch and move to Montana and go fishing. I am already in Montana. I am going to retire and move to Texas and the last thing I am going to do is go fishing!

One of those people I remember from the my ten years as a pastor in southern New Mexico is Gene Harbaugh. He was the pastor at the First Presbyterian Church in Carlsbad, and he said this is exactly what he was going to do. I enjoyed playing golf with Gene. And he is still in New Mexico, but he is retired. After I came to Miles City, I learned that the Harbaugh family lives in Jordan and they have a ranch. Tony Harbaugh is our Sheriff here in Custer County.

Now it is time for me to go back to the Fort Worth area and spend my retirement years with my wife Peggy whom many of you have met. We have a nice home in Benbrook which is the last exit on Interstate 20 in Fort Worth if you are headed west. Please continue to do so. I want to recover from the leg pain that may be caused by a damaged knee. I do not know if there is much hope from the hip pain; I am told that is

caused by the deteriorating L-3 vertebra in my back. All of you in the Presbyterian Women: I am deeply in your debt. Our Prayer Circle, too. May our good Lord continue to watch over you and

direct your steps as you wait for your new minister to be identified.

The Personnel Committee met with church secretary Jessica Bradley for her 6-month review. They gave Jessica excellent marks. Due to scheduling a final evaluation for Pastor Dave with be completed via phone / Skype later in July.

Session approved the bid from Regan's Plumbing & Heating for repair of the boiler zone valves. A dedication plaque for the Stained Glass Window repair has been ordered and should arrive in the next week. A dedication was held on Sunday, July 1 as this was Pastor Dave's last Sunday.

Session approved continued building use for the Critical Incident Stress Management team on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday of the month at 12:30 p.m. Dave has been serving on this team, which provides care and support to First Responders. Roxy volunteered to take care of opening and closing the building for this monthly meeting for the time being.

Session has called a short Congregational Meeting on Sunday, July 22, at 9:15 a.m. before worship.

This meeting was originally scheduled for May 21. The purpose of this meeting is to elect Alice Spear-Bankey and Ellen Terrett to serve as Deacons. They will be ordained / installed during worship that same day.

Membership & Outreach Committee plans to host a block party on July 22.

The next Session meeting will be held Monday, August 20 at 7:00 p.m.

#### 10 Interesting 4th of July Facts

- 1. On July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress, setting the 13 colonies on the road to freedom as a sovereign nation.
- 2. The Declaration of Independence was not officially signed until August 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1776 when 50 men signed it.
- 3. The additional 6 signatures on the Declaration of Independence, where signed at different times, the last of which was Thomas McKean, in January 1777.
- 4. The names of those who signed the the Declaration of Independence were kept secret for 6 months. If Independence had not been won, they would have been charged with treason, which was punishable by death.
- 5. Thomas Jefferson and John Adams both died on July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1826, the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence, which they both had signed. James Monroe died 5yrs later on July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831.
- 6. Calvin Coolidge is the only President to date that was born on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July.
- 7. The Phillipines gained their independence from America on July 4<sup>th</sup>.
- 8. The 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade in Bristol, RI is the oldest continuous Independence Day celebration in the U.S. It has been celebrated there since 1785.
- 9. On July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1776, the estimated number of people living in the newly independent nation was 2.5 million.
- **10.** The estimated population of the United States on July 4<sup>th</sup>, 2012 is 313.9 Million.

The purpose of the Veteran's Stand Down is for veterans to receive a wide range of support services in one location. According to the 2010 Montana Census over 5500 veterans reside in Southeastern Montana. The original Stand Down for veterans was modeled after the Stand Down concept used during World War II to provide a sage retreat for units returning from combat operations. At secure base camp areas, troops were able to take care of personal hygiene, get clean uniforms, enjoy warm meals, receive medical and dental care, mail and receive letters, and enjoy the camaraderie of friends in a safe environment. Stand Down afforded battle-weary soldiers the opportunity to renew their spirit, health and overall sense of well-being. Volunteers will be needed from 8 a.m. – 6 p.m. on Saturday, August 11th. Morning and afternoon shifts are available. Volunteers will be provided with t-shirts and a meal.
