Seeing God in the New Year

As we take our first steps into 2015 it is natural to reflect on the year that is wrapping up. That reflection may take the form of joy and thanksgiving as we celebrate the blessings that filled 2014 and the triumphs. It may take the form of disappointment as we see hopes and dreams that were left unrealized, resolutions that fell to the wayside, or friends and family members that we lost sometime during the last 356 days. Our relationship with God is not always one of the areas of reflection, yet it is so beneficial to do so. Often it is only in hindsight that we recognize what God has been doing in our midst over the last days, weeks, and months.

If you haven't had the opportunity yet, take time now to reflect: What was the best part of 2014 in your own life? Was God a part of it? What was your low point in 2014? Building and Grounds

A few of the little things that have kept the B & G committee busy lately include fixing a light switch in the children's education room and an electrical outlet in the Fellowship Hall, winterizing the building by putting covers over window air conditioners and the attic fan in the sanctuary, repairing a couple of door knobs.

Two of the bigger things the committee has been involved with are the installation of the T-Loop system in the sanctuary and overseeing the installation of the new heating system. Pastor Brandon connected a power conditioner to the sanctuary's audio system which removes background noises and buzz from the electrical signal. Harry Price, of the B&G Committee, is looking into making a decorative wooden holder for the "necklace" type T-Loop receivers and headsets that will be mounted on the wall by the East entrance to the sanctuary.

Heating Project Update

The project is going well and moving along. The units that will supply heating and cooling to the East Room, offices, communion prep room and children's education area have been installed on the ground outside near the elevator entrance and the electrical has been connected to them. The blower modules that will supply heat and cooling for each room have been installed on the walls. MDU has connected the power supply to our building that is required to make all the new equipment functional.

The next steps of the project will be: to install thermostats in the East Room, offices, communion prep room and children's education area which will give local temperature control to each room, and to connect the electrical and plumbing lines to the wall-mounted blower modules. After this is completed the heaters will be functional in these areas. A final stage of the project will be to install the heating unit, electrical, plumbing, and ductwork in the basement.

Thanks to everyone who is making this project possible through your prayers, patience, and monetary gifts. God has truly blessed this congregation.

Do You Wear Hearing Aids or any Assistive Listening Device?

The T-Loop system is installed in the sanctuary. Hooray! We are thankful to Harry Price, Vern Taylor, Duncan Bartholemew and Pastor Brandon for the hours they gave to this project.

We turned the system on for the first time on November 30th. On December 7th we had the official debut of the system in worship. Then on Sunday morning we invited Jay Richwine, a Hearing Device Specialist, to join us before and after worship to help users connect and fine tune their devices for use with the system. If you get a chance to thank Jay Richwine for volunteering his time to this effort, please do. Initial reports about the system from users are that the system does exactly what we intended for it to do. It allows them to hear announcements, prayers, songs, scriptures, and sermons clearer and better than before. In some cases the change has been dramatic. Praise God!

We will be fine tuning the system as needed, over time. We need your help with this. If you use the system please contact Pastor Brandon or a member of Building and Grounds if you become aware of any issues with the system so we can address it. If you or someone you know would like more information about the T-Loop system contact Pastor Brandon. Thanks again to everyone who has helped make this project a reality.

With God's Help: Capital Funds Campaign (for FPC heating/cooling project)

In the newsletter from October you may have noticed the article about this question. It indicated that the Finance Committee and Session were planning to pay for half of the cost with money from our Reserves and the other half would be raised from special gifts given by members of the congregation.

\$65,000. For some, it's inconceivable that we might raise that much money in special gifts without crippling our annual budget, especially since our last capital funds drive was less than three years ago (for the windows). For others, this goal is lofty but attainable, especially when we keep in mind all the benefits of it. As of December 15, we had received \$21,200 towards this goal with another \$8,975 pledged. If all of the pledge money is received we are almost halfway towards our goal. The most helpful question for everyone is, **in your conversations with God, do you believe God is asking you to invest in this project?**

If not, be at peace knowing you are doing what God wants you to do and pray God will show you a different way to invest in the life and ministries of FPC.

If so, be at peace knowing you are doing what God wants you to do and pray God will help you determine an appropriate amount to give.

Raising the funds for this project **With God's Help** is an exercise of faith. It requires us to do our part and trust God will provide the rest. We can't see the results of our efforts from here. In the end, we may raise the entire \$65,000 or your Session may need to approve the use of additional funds from our Reserves. We have undesignated funds available to use for this project if necessary. In either case, thanks be to God and many contributors who make it all possible. Time will tell and God will lead us.

Please Consider Making a 2015 Pledge

So far 22 pledge cards have been turned in for the 2015 ministry year. If you haven't please consider doing so at your earliest convenience. You are asked to share what you anticipate to give during 2015 and how you would like to break down the contributions. If you give regularly to the monthly mission special offerings, there is also a space for you to designate what you plan to give in that area as well. You should have received a pledge card with last month's newsletter, if you need one contact the church office.

Pledging isn't a contract, if your life situations change during 2015 and you need to adjust your pledge there will be no judgment or disappointment from the leadership of the church. Your pledge is the result of an intimate conversation between you and God concerning how much you can contribute to the ministry that God is doing here in our midst.

The greatest desire of the leadership of FPC is that every household make a commitment of some sort. Whether it be a \$1 a week or 10% of your income, whatever you believe you can commit to in gratitude to God, knowing that God has brought all of us together to be the Church of FPC in Miles City. Please prayerfully consider giving in 2015.

We are the church, God's people called together, equipped, and sent out to show and tell others that God loves them and to be Christ's hands and feet in the world. To do this faithfully and effectively, all of us must be actively involved in the financial stewardship of this church. The Session works with the Financial Secretary and the Finance Committee to manage the day-to-day budget and to continually evaluate and plan for the long term stewardship of the resources God gives us for the worship, mission, and ministries of the this church. As partners in the ministries and mission of this congregation you should be informed about this work.

The first table, called "GF Revenue," shows all the year-to-date income credited to the FPC general fund from offerings, pledges, and per capita. It gives an up-to-date summary of our actual income, the annual budget we approved, and the difference between them. Numbers that have parentheses around them indicate that the actual is less than the budgeted figure. **The summary for November's close indicates that our total income from offerings, broadcast sponsorships, and per capita are significantly under budget.**

The second table, called "GF Expenses," shows the actual expenses that have been charged to the church's general fund so far this year. **The summary indicates that our actual expenses in the areas of personnel, property, and other are well below what we anticipated.**

The third table, called "Net General Fund," shows the net balance of revenue and expenses. **This summary indicates that our general operating fund is \$4,703.57 under budget. This is better than we anticipated, but we need to keep in mind that the 2014 budget we approved already included a deficit.**

The fourth table, called "Other Funds," shows change **The "other" line accounts for both the income and expenses associated with the capital heating project. This figure will continue to fluctuate greatly as gifts are received and bills are paid on this major endeavor.**

The fifth table, called "Net General Fund + Other Funds," gives an overall snapshot of the health of church finances by showing how solvent/balanced we are. **In past months the monies in "other funds" have helped close the deficit gap and resulted in a pretty balanced financial standing. Due to payments being made out our heating project those funds no longer provide the cushion they once did. The negative figure in the YTD Actual vs Budget reflects the payment made.**

In summary, the church has received less income from offerings than we budgeted and our finances would be healthier if we made up this deficit to our income ASAP, especially when we remember that we are operating with a deficit budget. But the good news is that is that God provides. FPC staff and committee leaders have been working hard to keep the expenses of the church as low as possible, people are sponsoring the broadcast more than ever, and thanks to the faithful generosity of people who have given special gifts and bequests to FPC, and responsible managing and investing of these gifts by FPC leadership, we are on track to meet, and potentially exceed, our budget this year. **We could end up with a smaller deficit in our General Fund than we budgeted, though our net will be in the negative due to our heating project.**

Thank you for investing in the mission and ministries of First Presbyterian Church. Please continue to pray for God's guidance and provisions for the ministries, mission, and leadership of FPC and to continue leading us in the faithful stewardship of the resources entrusted to us.

January Special Offering: DEAP

The Developmental Educational Assistance Program (DEAP) is a not for profit organization that provides a variety of family education, support, childcare, health nutrition and residential services to families, children and adults. DEAP was organized in 1976 to provide family education and support services to families whose children had developmental disabilities or were at risk of developmental delays. Since organization, DEAP has expanded services and programs to include evaluation and diagnosis, caregiver, early intervention, supported and community living, family preservation, childcare resource and referral, and health education /

nutrition (WIC) services. Services are provided in 17 eastern Montana counties. Satellite offices are located in Colstrip and Glendive. DEAP successfully administers services through contracts awarded by the State of Montana's Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS) including Developmental Disability Services, Child and Family Services, Health Policy and Services, Human and Community Services. DEAP continues to respond to opportunities to expand services, and to seek other private and public funding sources that can support people's essential needs in ways they choose.
